

Stop Wildlife Crime











Wildlife crime consists of the illegal practices of trading wild animals, inflicting harm or stress upon an animal and the destruction of protected habitats and flora. These types of crime are detrimental to populations of rare species and they must be stopped.

Be aware of the possible crimes in your area:

- The removal of buildings and mature trees threaten bat habitats.
- Dog hunting activities around deer and hare populations are a sign of poaching.
- Bird egg collections remain illegal if made after 1954.
- The removal of hedges, which could be an 'Important hedgerow' or could affect nesting birds.
- The filling in/work on ditches, could be a habitat for water voles.
