Why record wildlife?

Development, wildlife crime and a changing climate is impacting the lives of many species in the UK. Recording sightings of at risk animals or evidence of their activity is the best way for us to monitor the changes within an endangered species' population. The more people that record, the better the understanding we will have of the effects on our local wildlife.

How to help

To record sightings and upload photos of vulnerable animals (see overleaf for a list), visit **iRecord** online.

What information should I record?

Date – What day did you see the animal?

Species – What is the name of the animal (common or Latin name).

Sex – Did you see a male, female, or both?

Quantity – How many individuals did you see?

Life stage – Adult, pre-adult or younger?

Photos – Upload any photos you take. They are the best proof of your record.

Location – Choose on the map where you saw the animal. This can be made hidden to the public eye.

Habitat – Describe the place you saw the animal in. Was it in a park, garden, coastal area...?.
