# SERVICES FOR THE THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER

Each week we have been giving you suggestions for virtual or online worship and this week is no exception. However, if you want to know more of what is out there, you might like one of the items coming up during this week's edition of '**Sunday**' on BBC **Radio 4** - "With a wide variety of online worship now available to anyone anywhere, Rev Fergus Butler-Gallie offers a guide to where you can surf the services that meet your liturgical tastes: beginning with Protestant denominations". The programme is broadcast at **7.10** on Sunday morning but of course will also be available to hear again on the BBC website.

The weekly **Sunday Service** on BBC **Radio 4** is at **8.10am**. This week the programme is entitled "We had hoped...." This is what the info on the website says:

"But we had hoped..." The words of two of Jesus' disciples to a stranger on the road to Emmaus. In times of grief and disappointment, there is one thing left to cling to; that thing is hope. Professor Jennifer Strawbridge of Mansfield College, Oxford and the Revd, Dr Steve Nolan, Chaplain at Princess Alice Hospice, lead a reflection on where we find hope in times of despair. They explore Jesus' appearance to his two disciples on the Road to Emmaus and how that encounter speaks to us today".

There is a **live service** on the **Church of England'**s website and on their Facebook page at **9.00am**.

**Chichester Cathedral** are continuing to deliver **live streamed services**. You can access these at <u>www.chichestercathedral.org.uk/services/live-services</u> just click on the link and it will take you to the page with instructions on how to view live.

**Sunday Worship** on **BBC1** comes from Hereford Cathedral and is being shown at **1100** (have you noticed how the time seems to change every week?).

The first hymn is 'And can it be' written by Charles Wesley. He wrote it in 1738 to celebrate his conversion. Of interest is that the lines "My chains fell off, my heart was free/I rose, went forth, and followed thee" are based on the liberation of the apostle Peter described in the Acts of the Apostles, chapter 12 verses 6-11, in which the apostle Peter is rescued from prison by an angel. This part of the chapter tells that after Peter was put into prison by King Herod, on the night before his trial an angel appeared to him, and told him to leave. Peter's chains fell off, and he

followed the angel out of prison, thinking it was a vision. The prison doors opened of their own accord, and the angel led Peter into the city.

**Songs of Praise** will be broadcast at **1.15** on **BBC1** and their theme this week is Christian Pilgrimage. It includes highlights of journeys the programme has made to ancient places of pilgrimage. Given that we are not allowed to make any journeys ourselves, this at least lets others do it for us!
